Synopsis

Climate Change is systems change, complex because planetary and human systems cannot change overnight, and yet it has become clear that human excess consumption has damaged the planet in the Anthropocene Age. Systems change has many dimensions, of which the moral issue is that there is injustice inflicted on both humans (social inequities) and the planet (biodiversity loss, human pollution and destruction of irreplaceable minerals and habitat). To change requires a mindset change and not just state or market, but also communities and individual levels.

At the global level, COP28 and COP15 have finally agreed there is serious warming up and also biodiversity loss, but there is lack of meaningful action because of disagreements at the geopolitical level. War is likely to delay climate action since coal and nuclear power are being seriously considered again, postponing clean energy transformation. The world is also running out of key minerals that can help the clean energy transformation.

Can we find a Middle Path to green inclusive growth versus the degrowth debate? How do we change the narrative and empower the grassroot communities to act in the right direction that will change state and market forces?

The right focus is now what to do and what types of social action will make a difference. This conference brings together a stock take of action to-date, and assesses what kind of climate action can be taken at the local, community, national (Malaysia), state (Penang and others) and regional, global levels that would make meaningful impact or difference.
